St Pierre du Bois

Lihou Mesolithic Site **occupation site** **GU582**

Excavations in 2000-2001 showed this site to be extensive and of Mesolithic date.

Lihou Priory priory GU228

This medieval priory consisted of a church, domestic buildings, a dovecote and fishtraps; the rest of the island would have been divided into fields and farmed. There are extensive remains both standing and buried, it has been the subject of a series of excavations from the 19th century through to the early 21st.

Lihou Fish Traps **fish trap** **GU2683**

Beach boulder and stone built walls designed to trap fish in shallow water on the outgoing tide. Located in the bay south of Lihou Priory and probably its contemporary.

Lihou Flint Scatter **findspot** **GU581**

One of several places with prehistoric flint scatters on Lihou Island.

Lihou Flint Scatter **findspot** **GU583**

One of several places with prehistoric flint scatters on Lihou Island.

Creux es Faies **passage grave** **GU190**

A prehistoric stone built chamber covered by an earthen mound; excavated in the 19th century. During the Occupation a mortar emplacement was constructed on top of the mound.

Camp Varouf Settlement **settlement** **GU553/584**

Quantities of flint and prehistoric pottery have been found eroding from the top of the south beach. In 1998 an excavation was carried out revealing evidence of early Neolithic and early Bronze Age settlement.

Fort Saumarez **fort** **GU233**

An existing battery at Fort Saumarez was extended and a Martello Tower added, in 1803/04. During the Occupation the Germans built bunkers underneath the fort and a watch tower on top of the Martello Tower. The whole headland was extensively fortified at this time.

L'Eree Battery **battery** **GU234**

Part of the Napoleonic coastal defences; built on the site of a destroyed prehistoric monument known as le Dehuset.

St Saviour

Le Trepied at le Catoroc passage grave GU192

Prehistoric megalithic burial chamber. All traces of a covering mound have disappeared and the remains stand exposed on a bare flat hillock at the southern end of Perelle Bay.

Mont Chinchon Battery battery GU229

Part of Guernsey's 18th century coastal defences.

18th century magazine associated with Mont Chinchon Battery

Catoroc Watch House lookout GU232

Part of Guernsey's 18th century coastal defences.

Cists at le Catoroc cist burials GU633

Four Iron Age cists were near le Trepied in the nineteenth century, the exact location is uncertain. They contained iron weapons, tools and pottery.

Chemin le Roi at le Catoroc road

The track which passes le Trepied and heads to the south east is one of the ancient 'Chemin le Roi'.

"Perleberg" at le Catoroc German Occupation battery GU793

Resistance nest (Widerstandsnest) l'erleberg positioned between Strongpoints Langenberg and Reichenberg. Part of the coastal defence designed to prevent enemy landing. This site is strung out along the coast and only part of it falls within the range of this list. Defences included: 2x4.7cm Pak (GU737, GU2639); 3x2cm Flak emplacement (GU736, GU2642, GU2643); machine gun post (GU2640).

La Capelle Flint Site findspot GU535

Quantities of prehistoric flints have been found on this islet.

Chapelle Dom Hue chapel

Situated on La Capelle Islet, masonry remains of a probable Benedictine cell contemporary with Lihou Priory,
